THE MOVE EAST: AN EXPLANATION

FRATERNITY MOVES ITS HEADQUARTERS AND STAFF TO CONNECTICUT

In June 2015, the fraternity moved its headquarters and staff residence to New Haven, Connecticut. The seeds for the relocation were planted in November 2011 when the fraternity's long-time Executive Director, William Millard, ILL 1980, announced that he wanted to retire. Upon the recommendation of the Succession Committee chaired by Don French, MI 1953, the Board of Governors engaged an independent outside consultant to conduct an internal assessment report.

The fundamental conclusion of this report was that the fraternity needed to stabilize its finances, reorganize its office staff, modernize operations, hire a third Chapter Service Consultant ("CSC"), and improve fundraising efforts and results. The report offered only one specific short term recommendation: switch to a bi-annual convention as our annual convention carries a net cost of about \$27,000 annually.

While rejecting the bi-annual concept, the board recognized that it needed to find other ways to stretch its financial resources. After countless discussions, the board decided that it would no longer outsource the day to day management of the fraternity as it had for 40 years, and would

consolidate the headquarters and CSC residence in one location that was central to the locations of our chapters and alumni.

An analysis showed that 19 of our 33 chapters were located on the eastern seaboard, and 18 are within a day's drive of New Haven.

The new headquarters is a 2,000+ square foot, newly refurbished ranch-style home in a residential neighborhood backing up to a forest preserve. The home has three bedrooms and three bathrooms with dedicated space for the fraternity's office space and archives. To minimize moving expenses, two volunteers traveled to Chicago to supervise and assist the CSCs in packing up the office.

The benefit of these changes was immediate: rent and overhead expenses have been reduced by approximately \$30,000 per year. All 33 chapters have been scheduled for a

CSC visit by the end of January 2016, with some chapters getting multiple visits. The relocation "dividend" also enabled the fraternity to engage outside speakers for training and education at this past summer's convention and to dramatically upgrade our electronic communications infrastructure. While the savings are insufficient to cover a third full time CSC, it has enabled the fraternity to extend the contracts of our "outgoing" CSCs through the early fall so that all chapters which needed an early visitation to assist with recruitment and/or overall organization and training would be provided resources for these purposes.

HISTORIC NEW PARTNERSHIP

OUR PLEDGE TO STOP SEXUAL ASSAULT BEFORE IT HAPPENS

For the first time in the our history, the International Fraternity entered into a partner-ship with an advocacy group with the hope of bringing a broader understanding on the issue of sexual violence. In October, Alpha Delta Phi formally partnered with "It's On Us", which was launched by the Center for American Progress' Generation Progress - an initiative of the White House. The campaign seeks to engage college students and all members of campus communities in preventing sexual assault by defining consent, and stopping sexual assault before it happens. Alpha Delta Phi believes that our members are leaders on this issue already as evidenced in the Spring 2015 issue of *Xaipe* but that his partnership will strengthen that commitment.

According to their website, ""It's On Us" aims to fundamentally shift the way we think about sexual assault, by inspiring everyone to see it as their responsibility to do something, big or small, to prevent it. The campaign reflects the belief that sexual assault isn't just an issue involving a crime committed by a perpetrator against a victim, but one in which the rest of us also have a role to play."

Alpha Delta Phi's role in this partnership is to educate all our members on how they can pledge to end sexual violence and raise awareness on their campus and communities.

I PLEDGE

To **RECOGNIZE** that non-consensual sex is sexual assault.

To **IDENTIFY** situations in which sexual assault may occur.

To **INTERVENE** in situations where consent has not or cannot be given.

To **CREATE** an environment in which sexual assault is unacceptable and survivors are supported.

MANUSCRIPT OR ROUGH DRAFT?

BOOK REVIEW: GO SET A WATCHMAN IS A WONDERFUL READ

Harper Lee, the quiet southern author of <u>To Kill a Mocking Bird</u>, wrote <u>The Watchman</u> two years before the publishing the story we know so well through the book and the movie. <u>Watchman</u> was the first novel Lee sent to the publisher. The response was on the order of: "interesting story but I would like to see the family from a young girl's point of view."

Back to the typewriter and out came a monumental opus we know today as To Kill a Mockingbird. We all read it and most of us saw the movie. Most of us look at Atticus Finch and see Gregory Peck. He defined the character, a man tilting against a racist southern society in the depths of the 1930's depression. He defended a black man who was accused of raping a white woman. With incredible odds against his case, he stood tall against a hurricane of racism.

But that, as they say, is not the end of the story. The first manuscript was found, not long after the death of Miss

HARPER LEE

Lee's older sister. Unedited and raw, Harper Lee's wish was, if it should ever be published, the manuscript not be edited.

I loved both books for what they are. They examine a white family in its struggle to define themselves in an integrated world.

Many critics disapproved of or scorned the <u>Watchman</u> as a rough draft and, in the extreme, not wor-

thy of publication. I will not give away the plot line or my conclusions. Rather, I wish you would read it with an open mind. My synopsis is roughly as follows:

The family we know from Mockingbird lives in the poverty stricken South amid the depths of the Great Depression, during a resurgence of the Klan. Three decades later we meet the same family, again from the daughter Scout's point of view, dealing with a collision of realities. Scout lives in New York and visits her hometown. She expects Atticus has not changed from the parental ideal. Yet, she discovers that he is unwittingly has a Gordian choice. To paraphrase Atticus's words, how can we accept new voters into our democracy who have no concept of the importance of the vote; let alone, have any understanding democratic process?

These two books are a must read companion set. In today's century, there is little understanding of the dilemma presented to Southern black and white families. After years of clearly defined social strata – how do we integrate?

Do not read the <u>Watchman</u> for its author's refined literary skill. Read it as a raw and tender approach to the turbulent mid-century struggle. Atticus is not a bigot, just a man bound in History and Scout is a young woman realizing that her father is human and not the idealized dad we all hope for. \bigstar


