Open Letter from the President on Preventing Sexual Violence

Spring has finally come to most of our campuses and with it the emergence of the myriad of seasonal challenges. For the undergraduates, the exam season is soon to commence; for graduating seniors, the prospect of a job or the challenge of grad-school looms. While these transitions and challenges have their place in all our lives, there exists an unfortunate challenge we must tackle together. Sadly, it is one passed to us from past generations and one we must now face full on with the resolution to erase it at all costs – Sexual Assault.

When I was asked to write this letter about sexual assault, I hesitated. Let's face it, this isn't an uplifting topic, but it's something that we need to openly discuss as a society. As more and more organizations are partnering with coalitions such as NO MORE and It's On Us, we need to consider what we can do to take a stand against the issue of sexual assault and how we can empower our men to help put an end to the "rape culture". It is never appropriate to use physical strength to force someone to do anything they do not want. Using alcohol or drugs to lower someone's resistance to having sex is never appropriate. Treat the rest of the world with the same respect you would like from it.

Simply, if you are about to do something that you know might be questionable, ask yourself the following question: would you want your sister to have a man do that to her? Or more to the point, would you want that done to you. Disturbing as it may be, the overt jocularity with which many treat sexual misbehavior is gutter behavior.

Incidents of sexual violence are too frequent and it seems they have become a regular part of the evening news. It disgusts me every time to hear graphic details on the news or on social media. Too often fraternities are at the center of these stories and that needs to stop. The world has fraternities under a microscope and for good reason. The founding principles of fraternities were based on fostering positive leadership and teaching young men what it meant to be successful in society. Violent behavior and physical abuse have no place in our society nor is it what Samuel Eells had in mind when drafting the aims of our fraternity.

Alpha Deltas need to set good examples and regularly present them. Not tolerating sexual abuse means acting to stop misbehavior; we cannot look away and avoid action. It's time for us to stand up and intervene now. ★

## CHAPTER STANDOUT: TORONTO CHAPTER

CHAPTER TEAMS WITH SORORITY  
TO RAISE CAMPUS AWARENESS

This past March, the Toronto Chapter and the Sisters of Kappa Kappa Gamma hosted a seminar to raise awareness and combat the prevalence of both sexual assault and relationship abuse on university campuses across North America. An Assault Counsellor at the University of Toronto, Cheryl Champagne, as well as Celia Wandio, an Equity Studies Student at University of Toronto, presented on preventative measures against sexual assault, and provided ways to support victims of abuse and assault. A workshop followed the presentation, where those in attendance discussed situations that relate specifically to the responsibilities of members of the Greek community. In particular, we worked on ways to ensure the safety and comfort of guests in our home during social gatherings, and to propagate a culture of consent, acceptance, and support in our house and the community around us. The eradication of sexual assault begins with the education of students, and recognition on their part for the necessity of respectful and appropriate attitudes. ★

## MR. ROCHESTER: PETER HEINRICH

ROCHESTER 1960

Peter Heinrich died peacefully on October 9th, 2014, following a year-long battle with Leukemia. He was 76.

Pete was a lifelong resident of the Rochester, New York area. He attended Brighton High School. Brighton was one of the many organizations which benefited from his loyalty and generosity. With others he helped form the Brighton School Alumni Association to raise money for scholarships and also to recognize notable alumni at an annual banquet which he regularly co-hosted.

Pete was an English major at the University of Rochester. Then he went to the Cornell University School of Hotel Administration; his many years as a successful restaurateur and hotelier followed. The Rochester Alpha Delta's 150th anniversary, and the Alpha Delta Phi International's 168th annual convention were held at the

Lodge at Woodcliff, a first class hotel; Pete was a principal owner. Pete's reputation in the hospitality industry led the Rochester Institute of Technology to engage him as an adjunct professor at its American College in Dubrovnik, Croatia.

Generosity was Pete's middle name. He founded the Heinrich Family Memorial Fund for

(YMCA) Camp Cory Scholarships. The camp was fortunate to have him as an alumnus, board member and loyal friend and supporter.

Of course the U of R was one of Pete's interests. In addition to ongoing generosity, he worked for the good of the chapter and the fraternity system with the string of managers in the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs and also was a member of the Alumni Hellenic Council. And he kept in touch with the big picture by serving on the Trustee's Council of the College.

As a member of the Board of Governors of ADP International, Pete kept involved in its activities. The Board has resolved to honor Pete with the Alpha Delta Phi Award in recognition of his distinguished service to the fraternity.

The Rochester Chapter of Alpha Delta Phi benefited substantially from Pete's many years of association. He served formally and informally as an alumni advisor, and more than once was president of the Genesee Graduate Chapter. During those times over the last three or four decades, when the chapter or some members had conducted themselves in such a manner as to earn suspension, Pete

was right there to pull together a group of alumni to work with the university to amend the situation. In 2003 Pete was awarded the William Lyons Vick Unsung Hero Award from International, recognizing the persistent, yet unassuming leadership he brought to the organization.

There is a bittersweet end to this memento. As a part of the 2014 Meliora celebration, the Genesee Graduate Chapter established two new awards. One is the Lifetime Service Award in recognition of outstanding stewardship of the ideals and values championed by the Alpha Delta Phi. Pete and myself were recipients. The other new award, The Peter B. Heinrich and Roger W. Zaenglein Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Service, was given to Evan Alter, R '13 and Jonathan LoTempio, Jr., R '14.

Pete died a week before. He leaves a legacy of dedicated service. ★

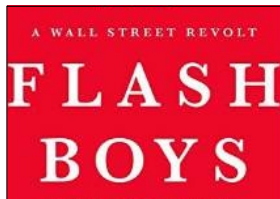

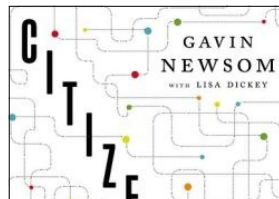

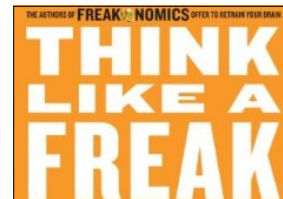

## ALABAMA AFFILIATE

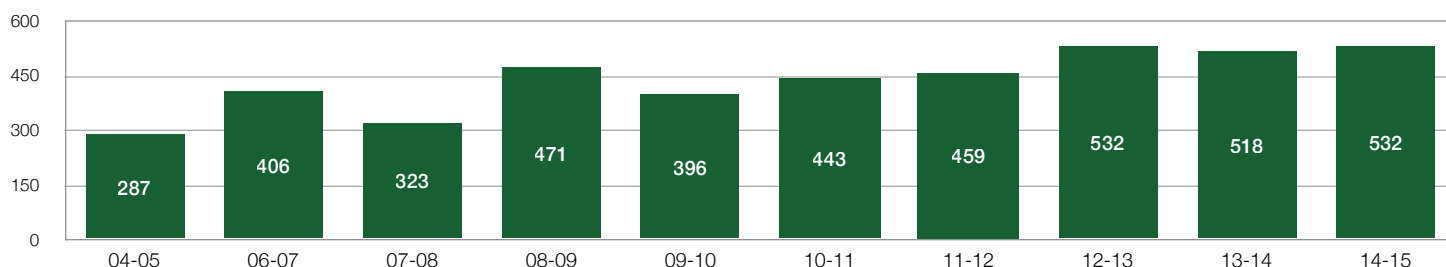
TUSCALOOSA, AL

## BINGHAMTON

The 39-member Binghamton Chapter has become famous for its partnership in planning the campus Art Awakening Festival, a collaborative effort to unite student groups and bring attention to the arts.

## BOWDOIN (Graduate Chapter)

The chapter once again awarded the FDR Cup to a Bowdoin student "whose vision, humanity, and courage most contributed to making Bowdoin a better college." Alpha Delts gathered at the old chapter house for the 2014 summer reunion and for New Year's 2015.

## BRUNONIAN (Brown University)

This year brought the chapter's largest new incoming class since 2007. In the Fall, the Brunonian Chapter will have 59 Alpha Delts living in the university-provided dorm for their chapter.

## CAPITAL AFFILIATE (GW University)

The Capital Affiliate will have doubled its initial class size following its April initiation, with only one member graduating in May. At 75% female, the group hopes to find ways to recruit more men.

## COLUMBIA

The exclusive, 56-member "hipster" fraternity on campus is in good standing with the university with 11 incoming initiates. The group volunteers with Story Pirates to celebrate literature and arts with young people.

## GRANITE (University of New Hampshire)

After hosting the Society's 14th Convention in 2014, the Granite Chapter is refocusing its ef-

forts to reinvigorate the chapter, and grow it to a sustainable number.

## MIDDLETOWN (Wesleyan University)

Despite significant student demand for changes to Greek Life, and strict new rules for campus Greeks, ADPS remains a positive element at Wesleyan. The chapter initiated 23 members last semester, has 74 total members, and a prospective class of 35.

## PENN AFFILIATE

After a brief and scary dip in membership numbers, the eclectic Penn Affiliate is back up to 17 members and about 60% female. The group enjoys video game nights, karaoke, cook-off challenges, and a variety of community service activities.

## PLATTSBURGH AFFILIATE

Plattsburgh has 21 members, almost all sophomores and juniors. The group is establishing a standards board to set an example for positive influence by Greeks on campus.

## RENSSELAER AFFILIATE

The Society's newest affiliate is beginning rush for the first group after the founders. The group is housed together on campus in an apartment-style dorm for students with an affinity for design and the arts.








## STANFORD

The Stanford Chapter is strong with 48 members. Cody Laux received the Daniel Pearl Award for Literary Excellence, the Samuel Eells Foundation's top literary prize for overall excellence in fiction, non-fiction, poetry, and photography.
